Species: Mid-Asian ibex
Date taken: September 2015
Location: Naryn Region, Kyrgyzstan

Outfitter: ProfiHunt

Highlights: The mid-Asian ibex was the very first animal I harvested on my quest to complete the Capra World Slam. When my father and I went on this hunt, we had no idea we would eventually begin pursuing the prestigious honor Grand Slam Club/Ovis bestows on rare individuals who rise to the challenge of taking certain species. The hunt itself was made even more difficult because of the strong language barrier between hunter and guide. In fact, to get around this obstacle, I learned to communicate through hand gestures. which proved to be an international language anyone can understand. To complete the task of a successful hunt, we traversed the terrain on horseback for at least eight hours every day, enduring some of the most challenging mountains I have ever journeyed through, climbing, at times, to elevations 15,000 feet above sea level. On the third day of the hunt, our group came across a group of ibex and stalked them for 300 yards until they stopped. Simultaneously, my father and I set up and shot together, harvesting two mid-Asian ibex, side-by-side.
